



'Word of God' Sunday next weekend.

On September 30, 2019, on the liturgical memorial of St. Jerome, Pope Francis announced that the Third

Sunday in Ordinary Time would be celebrated as the Sunday of the Word of God. In Australia the Bishops decided that we will celebrate 'The Word of God' on the first Sunday in February. To introduce this the Holy Father wrote Apostolic Letter, "Aperuit illis: Instituting the Sunday of the Word of God". It is a beautiful letter encouraging us to love, study, revere and pray with the Word of God (The Bible) and reminds us of its supernatural power. In a beautiful paragraph he said:



"The relationship between the Risen Lord, the community of believers and sacred Scripture is essential to our identity as Christians. Without the Lord who opens our minds to them, it is impossible to understand the Scriptures in depth. Yet the contrary is equally true: without the Scriptures, the events of the mission of Jesus and of his Church in this world would remain incomprehensible. Hence, Saint Jerome could rightly claim:

"Ignorance of the Scriptures is ignorance of Christ" (Commentary on Book of Isaiah, Prologue: PL 24,17B)."

We will celebrate the 'Word of God' Sunday next weekend - the 6th and 7th of February.

A message from the Clergy Office.

The Congregation for the Divine Worship has issued a Note concerning the Imposition of Ashes in this time of pandemic.

For practical point of view, "Turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel" or "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return" will be said only once rather than repeating the formula to each person. Additionally this year the ashes will be distributed differently — Fr Roberto is still thinking through how to do this without touching people's foreheads. One option is to sprinkle the ashes on your head OR dabbing the ashes on the forehead using swabs.



Pastorally, given that the usual practice in Australia is for the ashes to be daubed on the foreheads of the faithful in the form of a cross rather than sprinkled on the head. It could be helpful to read the following:

- The act of putting on ashes symbolizes fragility and mortality, and the need to be redeemed by the mercy of God. Far from being a merely external act, it symbolizes that attitude of internal penance to which all the baptised are called during Lent.
- The placing of ashes on top of the heads is the more ancient practice.
- It is common method in many parts of the world.
- In time of Covid19 it has the advantage of not requiring the priest to contact the skin of many people one after another, risking inadvertent infection
- The fact that the ashes are not readily visible to others is of no concern, since they are principally intended as a sign for the person receiving them and not for others.
