



Solemnity of Sts Peter and Paul.

St Peter's true and original name was Simon. He was born in Bethsaida a town on the Lake of Gennesaret or Galilee. The Apostle Andrew was his brother and the Apostle Phillip came from the same town. He settled in Capharnaum where he was living with his mother-in-law in his own house. In that town he pursued the occupation of fisherman, possessing his own boat.

Jesus changed his name of Simon to Petros, (Peter) a proof that Christ had already special views with regard to Simon. Though of irresolute character, he clings with the greatest fidelity, firmness of faith and inward love to the Saviour; he is full of zeal and enthusiasm though easily accessible to external influences and intimidated by difficulties. The more prominent of the Apostles in the list of the twelve on the occasion of

their solemn call not only does Peter stand always at their head and his surname Petrus is especially emphasized. Peter wrote two Epistles in the Bible 1 Peter and 2 Peter. From 1 Peter 5: 8,9 we read: "Keep sober and alert, because your enemy the devil is on the prowl like a roaring lion, looking for someone to devour. Stand up to him, strong in faith and in the knowledge that it is the same kind of suffering that the community of your brothers throughout the world is undergoing." And in the Gospel of John 6: 68-69 he said: "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life; and we have believed, and have come to know that you are the Holy One of God."

Saint Paul was born at Tarsus in Cilicia of a father who was a Roman citizen of a family in which piety was hereditary and which was much attached to Pharisaic traditions and observances. Young Saul (his Jewish name) learned how to make tents or rather to make the mohair (fabric from goats) He received his education at the school of Gamaliel. He takes



an active part in the martyrdom of St Stephen. He had a radical conversion after having had a spiritual experience where God spoke to him: "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me". He was very adamant in getting all Christians and arresting them. Paul is certain of having seen Christ as did the other Apostles; He declared that Christ appeared to him after his resurrection. His conversion is due to all-powerful grace. He was baptized and recovered his sight that he lost during his encounter with the Lord. He made 3 great apostolic expeditions of which Antioch was the starting point. He became the apostle to the gentiles. He wrote 13 letters to the Christian communities that form a good section of the New Testament. In his 1 letter to the Corinthians, he wrote the famous passage: "Love is patient and kind; love is never jealous; love is never boastful or conceited, it is never rude and never seeks its own advantage, it does not take offence or store up grievances. Love does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but finds its joy in the truth." In his 2 letter to Timothy he speaks a prophecy about the end of the world. He says: "But mark this: there will be terrible times in the last days. People will be lovers of money, boastful, proud, abusive, disobedient to their parents, ungrateful, unholy, without love, unforgiving, slanderous, without self-control, brutal...treacherous, rash, conceited, lovers of pleasure rather than lovers of God."

St Peter and St Paul died as martyrs; their feast is the 29th of June. St Peter and St Paul, pray for us.
